


A Liberal Academy

he education of Rikkyo University has been built upon the foundation of liberal arts, going beyond the simple acquisition of intellectual skills. Rikkyo aims to develop the students' power to collaborate with the people of diverse values and beliefs so that we may create to realize a truly human society in the world. Liberal Arts education has recently been evaluated as important and in high demand as globalization continues to impact and shape our lives. Rikkyo seeks to produce the global talent, who may exhibit leadership through the cooperation with other people in the world.

Rikkyo University is an ideal place for students to pursue liberal arts education and empower themselves to explore the unknown territory to be discovered, in which they may gain a new insight and perspective. Rikkyo offers a number of opportunities for students to learn to fulfill their potential, which makes Rikkyo a truly liberal academy.





The history of Rikkyo University goes back to the "Rikkyo School," which was established in 1874 by Bishop Channing Moore Williams, a missionary of the American Episcopal Church. In a period when Christianity was severely oppressed, I am sure it must have been an immense hardship to establish a private school to teach Bible studies and English. However, Bishop Williams was convinced that teaching was his mission and chose the path of education even though the demand was so little. Even today, after more than 145 years, his attitude has not been lost. Rikkyo University exists not merely to provide education to meet the demands of society, but to return to society the edifice of knowledge that human beings have accumulated, with the mission to produce graduates who search for universal truth and work for a better world.

Liberal Arts, the core of Rikkyo's educational policy, should not be understood as a mere general education. It is the sort of education that values the pursuit of ideals which have yet to be achieved in the long history of humanity. In other words, it is the education that discusses dreams and makes them visible. I think that Rikkyo University has to be a "risky" place in a sense, in order to embody the authentic liberal arts education inherited from the Western tradition. We must continue our quest for the truth without the fear of criticizing and being criticized. We must be skeptical toward common sense, theories, and authority; we must analyze and relativize them, critically examining original sources and their broader relations. From time to time, you may encounter obstacles and your ideas may be rejected. During these times, I want you to challenge yourself to reconstitute your ideas, no matter how difficult it may be, and to gain the skills to analyze, communicate, and improve upon the world around you.

Rikkyo University is preparing to reaffirm its roots and strengthen its distinctive practices, in which Rikkyo's spirit of foundation and philosophy of education has been reflected. Especially in light of reforms such as the enrichment of the introduction phase education and leadership education, the development of the

university-wide Rikkyo minor program, and the reinvigoration of service learning, student volunteering, and community engagement, I am confident that we will be able to provide the best environment for the exploration of truth.



Origins of the Pursuit of Scholarship

1874	Bishop Channing Moore Williams establishes a small private school to teach Christian Bible and English studies in Tsukiji, Tokyo. A few students enroll, and soon afterwards, the school is named Rikkyo School.			
1883	Rikkyo School is renamed Rikkyo University School.			
1907	Rikkyo University School is reclassified from the specialty school, and renamed Rikkyo University.			
1918	Rikkyo University is relocated to Ikebukuro, Tokyo.			
1919	The construction of the Main Building, Rikkyo All Saints Chapel, Library (now Mather Library Memorial), Dormitories (now Buildings No. 2 and No. 3) and Main Dining Hall is completed.			
1922	Rikkyo University receives government accreditation and establishes the College of Arts as well as the College of Commerce and Preparatory Studies.			
1949	After World War II, the new education system is introduced in Japan, and Rikkyo University meets the accreditation requirement Accordingly, the following three colleges are founded: the College of Arts, the College of Economics, and the College of Science			
1958	The College of Sociology is established.			
1959	The College of Law and Politics is established.			
1990	Rikkyo University opens the second campus in Niiza, Saitama Prefecture.			
1997	Rikkyo University launches the university-wide General Curriculum.			
1998	The College of Tourism and the College of Community and Human Services are established on the Niiza campus.			
2002	The Graduate School of Business Administration, Graduate School of Social Design Studies, and Graduate School of Intercultural Communication are established.			
2004	Law School opens on the Ikebukuro campus.			
2006	The College of Business is established on the Ikebukuro campus. The College of Contemporary Psychology is established on the Niiza campus.			
2008	The College of Intercultural Communication is established on the Ikebukuro campus.			
2009	The Graduate School of Christian Studies is established on the Ikebukuro campus.			
2011	The Center for Japanese Language Education opens to support international students and visiting scholars.			
2012	Ikebukuro Library opens as a new, state-of-the-art facility capable of holding more than two million volumes of publications			
2013	The construction of Paul Rusch Athletics Center on the Ikebukuro campus is completed.			
2014	Rikkyo University celebrates the 140th anniversary. The Rikkyo Gakuin Pavilion "The Heritage and Future of Rikkyo" opens on the Ikebukuro campus.			
2015	The construction of St. Paul's Aquatics Center on the Niiza campus is completed.



Q: How did you come to choose Rikkyo University?

I had a strong hope of doing international business and there seemed to be many chances to realize my dream in Japan. My university had an exchange program with Rikkyo University in Japan, and upon looking into Rikkyo, I thought the small-group classes would allow me to easily concentrate on my studies. I also thought that the courses had a good balance between practicality and theory which would help students prepare for their future careers. And I also thought that the Japanese culture would fit my taste. To this day I'm satisfied with my decision. All of my expectations were met and even exceeded.

Q: What did you study as an undergraduate student?

I studied international business. I wrote my graduation thesis on the topic of "Deception in Cross-Cultural Business Negotiations in Japan." I approached the topic through such cultural concepts as *ongaeshi** and *amae**, as well as collectivism and role exchange theory.

Q: What are you studying now?

As a graduate student right now, I'm taking courses in the Master's Program in International Business, and I am deepening my knowledge every day. Recently I was enrolled in two electives, Strategic Negotiations and Technological Strategic Innovation in Asia. In the previous semester, however, I also chose to take electives in financial strategy, equity valuation, expatriate management, culture management, and international corporate governance.

Q: Which campus facilities do you think are useful for international students?

One of great places to study is the campus library. It's quiet and easy to concentrate there. All the books needed for research and leisure are in one place, and there is free Internet access. I used to read many newspapers there as a means of learning Japanese.

The Center for Japanese Language Education (CJLE) helps international students with writing their resumes, and the Career Center also assists them by holding mock interviews to prepare for job hunting. Both centers are great supporters for international students.

Q: Where do you like to meet with your friends on campus?

Whenever I go to the Global Lounge, I almost always see some of my friends hanging out there. You can also make new friends there. Many students on campus have varying backgrounds, so this is a place where a mix of students with differing majors within the university gather. We use the lounge as a meeting point before going out to lunch or dinner together.



Campus Life Support



Since its foundation, Rikkyo University has been one of the prestigious and leading private universities in Japan with a student body of approximately 20,000 which includes over 1,100 international students from around the globe. Rikkyo provides a premier educational opportunity and meticulous student support services at its two campuses in Ikebukuro and Niiza.

Support for International Students

International Office provides supports for special international students (exchange students) in admissions, registration of courses, accommodations, scholarship opportunities, health insurance, immigration, and other such related needs. For newly admitted students, International Office organizes the buddy system, in which Rikkyo students volunteer to help them adjust smoothly to campus life. International Office also operates the Global Lounge, where a number of events and activities are organized throughout the year with the assistance from international students and Rikkyo students.

Accommodations

Rikkyo University operates off-campus international dormitories in Tokyo and Saitama. The dormitories offer single-unit, furnished rooms that are equipped with a private bathroom and shower. An optional meal plan and a bedding rental service are available with additional fees. Dormitory managers are available on site to support the residents.

Japanese Language Program

Center for Japanese Language Education (CJLE) is the home of our Japanese Language Program and also offers various programs to support all the international students who study at Rikkyo University. Besides the Japanese language classes, CJLE provides many kinds of support for the language learning process both in and outside of the classroom. CJLE also offers the credit-bearing Short-Term Intensive Japanese Program for the students who would like to stay and study for a few weeks at Rikkyo in summer and/or winter.

Career Support

Career Center conducts several career support programs, providing students with assistance in their job search. For international students, Career Center and International Office hold a joint seminar on job searching for international students and also

a panel discussion that focuses on how to be successful in their job search as an international student.

Through 10 colleges, 27 departments, 8 disciplines, and 1 program, Rikkyo University undergraduate curriculum aims to educate the whole personality, based on the spirit of Liberal Arts and the pursuit of specialization.

Global Liberal Arts Program (GLAP), which was launched in 2017, is a selective program in order to cultivate global-minded leaders for the future. The students will take a variety of courses in liberal arts that are entirely taught in English. They will receive a Bachelor of Arts after successful completion. One of the program's highlights is its class size. Each year, only 20 students are admitted on a rigorous standard and are expected to be actively engaged in academic activities with instructors and international students.

As a part of its curriculum, it is mandatory for all the GLAP students to study abroad at Rikkyo's partner colleges or universities, in which they are expected to study the courses in liberal arts further. They are required to study abroad for one academic year starting from fall semester of their second year. When they come back to Rikkyo, they will continue their studies, while specializing in one of the three academic disciplines: Humanities, Citizenship, or Business.

During their studies at Rikkyo, the students are exposed to a number of opportunities to interact with international students on campus. There is an option for them to choose to live at one of the Rikkyo's international dormitories, where a number of exchange students live.

What do you do at Rikkyo University?

I mainly conduct research on the environment and organization of sport in Japan and European countries, especially focusing on the career development of athletes and challenges of their second careers.

As a former Judo practitioner, I also share my expertise in the course "Judo for Beginners," which is available for all undergraduate students.

How did you get into Judo?

My first encounter with Judo was when I was eight. My friend asked me to join the local Judo club in my home country of Austria. Although my mother is Japanese, I started Judo because of a genuine appreciation as a sport, rather than an interest in Japan, and became a member of the junior national team at the age of 17.

• Please tell us about your transition from a Judo practitioner to a researcher/educator?

I aspired to continue my career in competitive Judo after graduating from high school, but I became more interested in the culture of Japan, the birthplace of Judo and also my mother's home country. Therefore, I decided to enroll in the Department of East Asian Studies at the University of Vienna to major in Japanology. This was also when I first started to learn Japanese. While

developing my academic path, I was still active and participated in Judo competitions, making appearances twice in the Universiade, or the World Student Games.

Then I moved on to graduate school for a master's degree to conduct research on the Japanese corporate sport system. I continued my research in a doctoral program on the career development of Japanese athletes. During the doctoral program, I studied in Japan for two years as a research student. Although I once returned to Austria to complete my doctoral dissertation, the connection I made during that time brought me back to Japan to teach at Rikkyo University.

• What is your impression of Rikkyo University compared to universities in Austria?

Compared to European universities intended for higher education in specialized fields, I feel Japanese universities provide a great variety of courses and programs or activities besides the academic curriculum. Especially, based on the ideal of liberal arts, Rikkyo offers students plenty of opportunities to learn what they are passionate about. I am also enjoying the liberal ethos on our campus that allows me to design extra-curricular projects or to organize events.

• How is the reaction of your students for your Judo class?

Learning Japan's traditional martial arts from an international instructor seems eye-opening for students. I received feedback such

as "my previous strict impression on Judo has totally changed," and "I did not recognize until now that Judo is such a fun

sport to learn." I assume the reactions above come from a different attitude towards sports between Austria and Japan. In Austria, a fundamental approach to sports is that sports are something to be enjoyed by the mass of people for their fun and wellness. Competitive sports are also in line with such recreational activities but intended for people with a

focus on results in the games and events. In Japan, on the other hand, most sports seem to be designed for competition, which expects people to be rigidly dedicated and committed to the results. Although this is certainly one of Japan's strengths for their approach to sports, I think that it is also important for Japanese people to consider sports in a broader perspective.

• Specifically, what do you want to teach to your students through sports?

For example, parents in a number of countries positively accept
Judo as a sport that may teach children the manners and a sense of
respect for others. There are also people who start learning Judo
from an interest or adoration of Japanese culture. Some of my Judo
classes are offered in English, but I intentionally use Japanese for
greetings and "waza," or techniques. These are the rules
of Judo, and they are practiced all over the world.
Sports including Judo, I think, are an effective
way to communicate with people from different
countries in different languages. Japanese
students, because of lack of confidence in their
communication skills in a foreign language, tend to
hesitate to interact with foreigners, but I am sure sports can

I eventually discovered what I wanted to do in my life after continuing to pursue my interests while being confronted with many challenges. In conclusion, please allow me to give you a piece of advice for prospective students of Rikkyo University. "You do not have to be stuck in stereotypes. Take a broader view of your career and challenge yourself to pursue what you like from the bottom of your heart."






